Dear Matthew,

You may recall that Tracey Siddle met with you on 24th of March at 11:00 to introduce the Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm, and a follow on newsletter was issued on 15th of June to provide a further update.

The Project is now at a stage where we are moving on to section 47 consultation, which initially involves interactions with yourselves as a local planning authority, to seek feedback on the proposed document (SoCC = Statement of Community Consultation), which is a tool we will use to inform yourselves, and then once finalised your communities, on the basic Project information and how we intend to consult with them regarding the proposal over the next few years.

We are now, as a Project in a position to inform you that we are progressing with investigating **Norwich Main** National Grid substation as a proposed connection point for Hornsea Project Three. As such, I am writing to notify you that Broadland District Council is a **'B' authority**, as the land we are proposing to develop falls within your authority's area.

Under section 47 of the Planning Act 2008, the applicant (DONG Energy) must prepare a statement setting out how we propose to consult people living in the vicinity of the land. Before preparing this statement, we are required to consult all of the "B" authorities about what is to be included in the statement.

Over the past few months, we have met with planning department members at a number of authorities across the east coast to gain a better understanding of how we can best consult communities in your area. We have carefully considered all feedback and have used this to inform our draft SoCC (attached), which we are now requesting your feedback on.

Section 47(3), states that authorities must be given a **minimum of 28 days** to respond to the consultation. However, as the consultation falls across the school summer holiday, we have extended the deadline to accommodate for members that may be out of the office at times during this period.

Please can you provide any comments on our draft SoCC, by no later than **5pm on Friday 9th September 2016**.

I have attached a document titled *'Hornsea Project Three_Draft Statement of Community Consultation: Feedback Request'*, which outlines the different methods by which you can submit your feedback to the Project on this DRAFT document. We will also be sending a hardcopy of the draft document in the next couple of days to your office. Please let me know if this should be addressed to someone other than yourself.

During the consultation period on this draft SoCC, if you would like a phone call or face-to-face meeting to discuss the document or your comments in more detail prior to the 9th September deadline, we would be more than happy to arrange this. Once we have received all of the responses, we will review your comments and incorporate them into the final SoCC. We will then publish the final SoCC in local newspapers, and will send hardcopies of the document to your council office and to our CAP sites (Community Access Points), located across the Consultation Zone. We have also included a listed of potential sites and would appreciate your guidance on where to situated these.

As an A-D authority, you will also be consulted under section 42, and our Consents team will be in touch shortly if not already to discuss what this will involve in more detail (the initial document being the Scoping Report).

As a Project, we are also aware of other consultation activities that could occur in your area at the same time, and want to reassure you that we will be close contact with those Projects to avoid any confusion or consultation fatigued that might arise from this. Hornsea Project Three will strive to differentiate itself in this manner.

Draft Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC): Feedback Request

Dear Sir/Madam,

Under section 47¹ of the Planning Act 2008, the applicant (Hornsea Project Three offshore wind farm, on behalf of DONG Energy) must prepare a statement setting out how we propose to consult, about the proposed application, people living within the vicinity of the land. This statement is in the form of the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC), which consists of a high-level summary of the proposed Project and outlines how the Project seeks to consult with local communities and other stakeholders and seek feedback regarding concerns or queries in relation to this.

The Project is not yet at a stage where an application will be submitted (this is envisaged in 2018), however before then a great deal of consultation and assessments need to occur to feed into the final application. Before preparing the final SoCC, which will be published within local newspapers and available at Community Access Points, we must consult each local authority in which the proposed development is situated, about what is to be included in that statement (final SoCC). This consultation gives you the opportunity to review and comment on our proposed methods for community consultation, and consider whether this is the most effective approach for your local communities.

Your knowledge of local culture, socio-economics, history and geography is key to understanding how we can best approach consultation, and whether the extent of our consultation is sufficient. We therefore asked you to consider all aspects of our draft SoCC. This will include items such as:

- Have we provided enough information on the Project and background information?
- Is it clear on what and how the local community will be consulted?
- Are the proposed methods appropriate for your local demographic?
- Can you think of any dates during our first round of consultation events that may not be suitable?
- Is it clear where members of the community can find out more information?

The final SoCC which needs to be issued should provide your communities with the assurance that they have full access to Project information and are aware of how they can do this and how to seek further information or issue concerns.

Please provide any comments on the SoCC and Stakeholder Map by no later than 5pm on Friday 9th September 2016.

It was advised that early clarity on the landfall area and route of the onshore cable systems would be welcomed and avoid confusion.</p>	<p>1.1 Hornsea project three ("the Project") will avoid holding events during the half term window outlined by NCC.</p> <p>1.2 In the first instance, DONG Energy would like to make hardcopies of the SoCC and quarterly newsletters available at the relevant authority offices, including NCC. Such documents will only take up a very limited amount of space. Once the DCO application has been submitted, there is a statutory requirement to make the full suite of application documents available at local deposit points, which will be agreed with the relevant host authorities ("B" authorities) prior to the DCO application being submitted.</p> <p>1.3 NCC's concerns have been considered carefully by DONG Energy. Having reviewed all responses to the SoCC consultation with relevant authorities, and all technical and environmental information compiled to date, DONG Energy has been able to proceed with only one landfall and onshore cable route corridor in relation to the Project. This landfall zone lies to the North of Norwich (the more Western of the two initial landfall options shown in the draft SoCC that was issued to local planning authorities and The Planning Inspectorate) and the onshore cable route corridor proceeds in a southerly direction from there to the point of connection at Norwich Main substation. This responds directly to the concerns raised by NCC (both County members and Planning Officers), and will ensure greater clarity during the consultation process. Members of the public and other consultees should be able to identify the landfall zone and cable corridor associated with the Project and distinguish this from other projects in the area. The map displaying the onshore area has been updated accordingly in the final SoCC. There is no change to the wider Consultation Zone in order to ensure consistency in the SoCC process going forward.</p>
	South Norfolk District Council (SNDC)	2.1 The draft SoCC provides a useful breakdown of events, and as such, South Norfolk District Council (SNDC) do not wish to add anything further at this stage.	2.1 DONG Energy welcomes such comments. No further response or action is required at this stage.
	North Norfolk District Council (NNDC)	<p>3.1 North Norfolk District Council (NNDC) is concerned that as drafted the SoCC is not very clear as to the nature of the proposed onshore developments, to allow meaningful engagement. NNDC recommend including more information on the potential impact of the onshore cable route and station facility and programme of construction in the near and long-term. For example, the factors that influence the choice of onshore cable route, what width/depth of corridor is required, how long will the programme of works take. NNDC ask that DONG Energy make reference such issues more explicitly within the SoCC.</p> <p>3.2 NNDC is supportive of consultation proposals i.e. dedicated website, stakeholder briefings and newsletters.</p> <p>3.3 NNDC pointed out error in their office opening times.</p> <p>3.4 Revisions to stakeholder map have been marked in red.</p> <p>3.5 Consultation events</p> <p>3.5.1 NNDC suggested holding two events in NNDC - one for each corridor - and inviting the town and parish councils within each corridor. NNDC suggested holding the event in Holt for the western corridor and somewhere in Stalham and/or Hoveton for the eastern corridor.</p> <p>3.5.2 NNDC is happy to provide suggestions for venues, if the project provides more details about the format of the events.</p>	<p>3.1 As detailed in section 47 of the Planning Act, the purpose of the SoCC is to set out "...how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land", and as such, the purpose of the SoCC is to explain how the consultation process will take place, not to provide a full explanation of the Project as a whole. The SoCC therefore only includes a short summary of the proposed onshore developments, which is not intended to be exhaustive. The Project will provide more information on the onshore elements, including the onshore cable route and width/depth of cable corridor at the community consultation events. More information will also be available in the Scoping Report, which DONG Energy intends to issue to the Planning Inspectorate in late October 2016 and publish on the Project website. Importantly, the outcomes of this community consultation will directly influence decisions on the final parameters of the Project and Development Consents Order (DCO) application. The decision to proceed with one landfall and cable route provides clarity and responds to NNDC's concern.</p> <p>3.2 DONG Energy welcomes such comments. No further response or action is required at this stage, however will plan for such briefings and coordinate available dates.</p> <p>3.3 The NNDC office times have been amended in the final SoCC.</p> <p>3.4 The revisions to the stakeholder list have been incorporated.</p> <p>3.5 Consultation events</p> <p>3.5.1 The onshore cable route corridors have been refined to now include only one Western landfall and onshore corridor (a Project Update letter dated 26th September has been issued to Local Planning Authorities explaining this, and the final SoCC updated to reflect this). As such, the applicant proposes to hold one set of community consultation events in the vicinity of Holt, as per NNDC's suggestion. Local town and parish councils near Holt will be invited to attend the event.</p> <p>3.5.2 DONG Energy suggested a potential venue to NNDC, who confirmed that it was a good location and would be easily accessible for the majority of communities, which might be impacted by the proposal.</p>
	Broadland District Council (BDC)	<p>4.1 Broadland District Council (BDC) are not clear in which order the sections of the SoCC should be read, which is partly due to the fold out design.</p> <p>4.2 Environmental Information</p> <p>4.2.1 Under the PEIR section, the final sentence refers to "seeking feedback from local communities and other stakeholders on this". The SoCC needs to explain when this is likely to take place.</p>	<p>4.1 The final SoCC will be displayed (in portrait format) in local newspapers and at our community consultation events. The A3 fold out design format will be available at the council offices and Community Access Points (CAPs) across the Consultation Zone. Fold out copies will also be available at the community consultation events for the local community to take away with them. 


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Map showing the Hornsea Project Three offshore array area.

Mr Taylor's family had occupied the Manor House for many generations.


It was his father who donated the Corn Hall to the town.

1. The Purpose of Community Consultation

We at DONG Energy want to hear your views. This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) explains how we intend to consult with you on our proposed offshore wind farm Project as required under the Planning Act 2008.

It explains the opportunities for you to come and meet us, to ask questions and to comment on these plans. We adopt best practice for all of our projects, and would like to understand from you what will help us to do this in your area, so that we can deliver our Project responsibly and with community interests incorporated.

2. Background

DONG Energy is one of the leading energy groups in Northern Europe, headquartered in Denmark, with offices in London and elsewhere in the UK. We are the world leader in developing, constructing and operating offshore wind farms, with over 3,000 MW of operational capacity globally.

In August 2010, DONG Energy acquired the rights to develop the Hornsea Zone from Smart Wind Ltd, who was originally awarded the zone in The Crown Estate Round 3 bid process. To date, DONG Energy has obtained Development Consent Orders (DCOs) to develop Hornsea Project One and Hornsea Project Two.

This SoCC has been produced solely for the Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm, which is in the early pre-application stage for a DCO. We will provide full details about what this means from a community consultation perspective in the following sections.

3. Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm

Hornsea Project Three will be located over 120km offshore to the east of Projects One and Two, and is exploring an area of up to 606km². The offshore wind farm will be capable of generating up to 2,400 MW of electricity, which is enough to meet the average daily needs of well over 2 million homes.¹

Electricity generated by the offshore wind farm will be brought onshore via subsea cables buried onshore before connecting into an onshore substation and the national grid.

We are currently assessing potential cable route options from various locations in the proposed landfall area, in the vicinity of the North Norfolk coastline (see Consultation Zone map highlighting the Onshore Siting Area), and connecting into Norwich Main National Grid substation. This will be presented in the Scoping Report (see Environmental Information) and as something we will be seeking your opinion on as part of the consultation and planning process (see The Planning Process).

4. The Planning Process

As a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP), the Project must apply for a DCO. Consents for the wind farm, offshore and onshore cable route, including substations, will be included in the DCO.

The DCO application will be examined by the Planning Inspectorate (PINS), who will consider a number of issues, including the impacts on the local area, and must be satisfied that we have undertaken sufficient pre-application consultation with statutory consultees and local communities under consultation requirements contained in section 42 and section 47 of the Planning Act 2008.

If the application is accepted for examination, PINS will then coordinate the examination of our application with an independent Examining Authority panel, who will in turn make a recommendation to the Secretary of State (SoS) for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy. The SoS will then review and comment on this before making a decision on whether to grant a DCO.

This consultation is open to anyone who may feel directly or indirectly impacted by our proposal to build a new offshore wind farm, and the associated onshore cable route and substation. We will consult with individuals and communities living within the vicinity of the land affected by the DCO application, who we have identified through our consultation screening exercise could be affected by, or have an active interest in our Project.²



Family anger as thief steals £21k from mum

A man who stole more than £21,000 from his mother has been jailed.

Gavin Thorpe, 55, helped himself to £21,108 from his elderly mother's bank account between December 2012 and March 2015.

Norwich Crown Court heard the victim, who now suffers from dementia and Alzheimer's, "went into debt" as a result of the loss of money which has meant "she couldn't live her life how she wanted to".

Family members have had to give her money to help pay off what is owed, while her son-in-law has had to give up his job to help look after her as they cannot afford to pay for the level of care she now needs due to her deteriorating health.

Thorpe, of Chosterfield Cottages, Cromer, appeared at court this week to be sentenced having previously admitted fraud and theft.

The defendant, who accepted he had taken at least £10,500 dishonestly, has since agreed to pay back £31,500 after his pension matured.

The court heard family members wanted to see Thorpe jailed despite pledging to pay compensation.

Judge Anthony Bate, who jailed Thorpe for six months, said he recognised the family's feelings of "anger and betrayal" by Thorpe.

He said: "I can well understand how angry your family must feel at this gross breach of trust that you showed against your own mother."

A victim personal statement read out in court, written by the partner of the victim's grandson, who now looks after her finances, said her dementia has gotten worse and she now struggles to remember and being reminded of what happened "causes her a lot of upset and she often cries and says things like 'he's not my son'".

He said she did not want to sell her home but has had to turn it into a holiday home which gives her a bit of income "but still not enough to fund her care".

Michael Clare, for Thorpe, said his client was a man of previous good character who suffered from depression and should be given full credit for plea.

He said Thorpe, who was "coerced" had since paid back what he owed.

Thorpe was also ordered to pay £4,300 prosecution costs and made the subject of an indefinite restraining order: prohibiting him from contacting the victim directly or indirectly except through a solicitor.


